2023 Hispanic Heritage and Dia de los Muertos Exhibit and Celebration Sugar Land Heritage Foundation Report

SUMMARY - In 2023 the Sugar Land Heritage Foundation in conjunction with the City of Sugar Land and Sugar Land Town Square celebrated the 124th anniversary of Hispanic Heritage in Sugar Land, Texas. To honor this landmark in Sugar Land history, the Sugar Land Heritage Foundation and the City of Sugar Land sponsored a Hispanic Heritage and Dia de los Muertos exhibit from October 17 to November 4 at the Sugar Land Heritage Museum and Visitor Center. The three-week exhibit included a display of thirty ofrendas (altars) created by local families and students from Fort Bend Independent School District (FBISD) schools to commemorate their beloved ancestors who lived in Sugar Land and contributed to its development. The exhibit also included Hispanic Heritage artwork created by students from St. Laurence Catholic School, Sugar Land Middle School, James Reese Career & Technical Center, and Kempner High School as well as an altar honoring the Uvalde school shooting victims created by Quail Valley Middle School. Displays providing the significance of the "Little School of 400" and the history of San Isidro Cemetery were also available. To celebrate, share and honor Hispanic Heritage and Dia de los Muertos with an even wider audience a celebration was held on Saturday, October 21 at "Sugar Land Town Square" which included Mariachi music, folklorico and Aztec dancers, Hispanic cuisine, a costume contest, children's activities, and historical-cultural presentations. There were 7,500+ attendees at the Sugar Land Town Square celebration on October 21. The three-week exhibit at the Sugar Land Heritage Museum and the October 21 celebration at Sugar Land Town Square were extremely successful in celebrating Hispanic Heritage and Dia de los Muertos and promoting cultural awareness and diversity.

FINANCIALS – The 2023 budget for Hispanic Heritage and Dia de los Muertos exhibit, and celebration was prepared in February and set at \$20,000. The categories for the 2023 budget were as follows,

Support from local businesses, companies, foundations, organizations, and individuals was very positive with donations totaling \$25,650. Several area artists, professionals and volunteers also made significant contributions by donating "in-kind" work and/or services such as transportation, face painting, graphic design service, Catrina decor and printing.

Direct expenses for the 2023 Hispanic Heritage and Dia de los Muertos exhibit, and celebration totaled approximately \$21,660 as summarized in the following table. The original 2023 program budget did not include funds for "free children's painting classes" that were held on October 28 at the Heritage Museum. These "free children's painting classes" which were added to the 3-week museum exhibit activities were a tremendous success.
